## Earliest Australian Bird

Painted by Moses Griffith in 1772, this highly-finished and beautifully-preserved presentation drawing will be auctioned on **Tuesday**, **20 November**, in **Melbourne** (Moses Griffith, *Rainbow Lorikeet (Trichoglossus haematodus moluccanus)* 1772, estimate \$150,000-200,000, lot 27, pictured).

The bird of exquisite beauty was discovered by Captain Cook and his party when they first landed at Botany Bay on the east coast of Australia in April – May 1770. It is believed the Lorikeet depicted was drawn from life, and its convincing 'parrot-perkiness' would seem to denote a living model. Furthermore the animal is not posed in a scientifically informative, display manner – that is, so as to display its brilliant breast colours, or the distinctive bars on the underside of its wings.

The transiting of this bird makes quite a story, outliving its first owner a Raiatean priest, Tupaia, on the return voyage to England by the Endeavour. Tupaia died of dysentery in Batavia (Jakarta) in 1770. The bird was given by Sir Joseph Banks to Marmaduke Tunstall, who was a wealthy collector and an amateur of science. It is believed the specimen was collected while quite young, possibly as a nestling, as it does not have the characteristic bright red beak and eye ring of a fully mature (18-24 month) bird. The British climate cannot have been too adverse for the bird, which was painted subsequently by Peter Brown in 1794 (complete with its full adult colour).

'The offering of this masterpiece by Moses Griffith exemplifies Sotheby's Australia's commitment to offering exceptional examples from all periods of Australian art' said Geoffrey Smith, Chairman of Sotheby's Australia. 'The inclusion of this work follows the extraordinary result we achieved for The Sydney Bird Painter's *Hook-Billed Shrike (Grey Butcher Bird)* (circa 1792) which was sold by Sotheby's Australia in August 2012 for \$216,000 against a presale estimate of \$50,000-70,000.'
